
Mission

RISE ACT

The North Penn School District (NPSD) Board of School Directors signed a resolution in support of the RISE Act in March 2023. The Respond, Innovate, Succeed, and Empower (RISE) Act would be an amendment to the Higher Education Act (HEA) and help to ease the transition from high school to college for students with disabilities. Currently, students with disabilities need to provide their own documentation as proof of disability when entering an institute of higher education. Under the RISE Act, students would be able to continue using their documentation provided by their local school district.



NPSD Educational Foundation



The North Penn School District Educational Foundation raises essential funds through fundraisers and donations to support the premier education already provided by the NPSD.

A 501(c)(3) nonprofit, the Foundation is a collaborative effort among individuals committed to providing financial support for NPSD schools. The Foundation and NPSD are separate entities but work as partners in support of the children being educated in the district's 18 schools through classroom grants applied for by teachers and staff. The Foundation's desire to ignite student success for cutting-edge, creative innovation is made possible by donors who provide the funds supporting the grants. These grants help bring innovations to life through classroom equipment, field trips, project materials, program software, guest speakers and so much more. This allows an extension of North Penn's curriculum that wouldn't otherwise be possible.

Reading Is Fundamental (RIF)

LITERACY

Established in 1966, Reading is Fundamental (RIF) has ignited a love for literacy by providing free access to books and literacy resources. For over 30 years, North Penn School District has partnered with RIF to provide books to its approximate 1,000 first graders across 13 elementary schools. When funding was cut by the sponsors of the RIF organization, the NPSD Educational Foundation stepped in to ensure funding continued to provide fun literacy experiences to first graders throughout NPSD's 13 elementary schools.

Some of the events NPSD has made available to first graders include:

- A kickoff event for all first graders in the form of a play, "Alice Takes North Penn to Storyland".
- Kulp Elementary first graders adopted a penguin from the Philadelphia Zoo and learned all about penguins from reading about them.



At the end of each RIF event, students choose their own books for their home library. The interactions young children enjoy at home with their caregivers, especially conversation and hearing stories read aloud, play a significant role in academic success and beyond. Children who have limited access to books are deprived of the opportunity to learn about their world, acquire more sophisticated vocabulary, and understand how language works.

Elevate Learning

Students who feel supported in their schools are often more open to learning, and NPSD offers many unique experiences to elevate learning.



That's why each year, the middle schools hold an orientation for incoming 7th graders to get them ready to learn. At elementary schools, students participated in viewing



and discussing artwork of different cultures up-close through the Art Goes to School Program and continued learning and engaging over the summer through NPSD's optional asynchronous opportunities for summer learning. At the high school level, a number of NPHS students expressed interest

in taking American Sign Language and to be responsive to student

wants, needs and interest in this important life skill, the district developed a course to begin offering the opportunity. The NPHS Special Education Team re-opened the Practical Assessment and Exploration System (PAES) Lab which provides students the opportunity to explore areas of career



interests, community-based employment, functional skills and develop a portfolio of strengths and barriers to success. The district also introduced a therapy dog Mario, during the 2022-2023 school year who visited North Penn schools during the year to bring comfort and companionship to students and staff. To support learning initiatives, administrators and teachers continued enhancing their skills through professional

development. Elementary teachers in kindergarten through grade 2 enhanced their literacy teaching skills by attending the Fundations Level 2 Workshop training.



Students and staff of all abilities support and encourage each other

North Penn High School was recertified as a National Banner Unified Champion School by Special Olympics. NPHS was one of only 20 high schools in the state of Pennsylvania and 683 across the country to receive the designation. Schools are chosen for their commitment to inclusion by meeting 10 standards of excellence, including

unified sports programs, inclusive youth leadership, and whole-school engagement in

awareness and educational activities. The NPHS Unified Track Team continued to bring students of all abilities together to train and compete. The Unified Bocce teams taught officers from the Police Athletic League how to play the game and then competed in an exhibition match. Additionally, about 80 NPHS students were freezin' for a reason when they braved the icy water at Citizens Bank Park to raise over \$12,000 for the Special Olympics during the annual Polar Plunge.

Students across the district rocked their socks in celebration of World Down Syndrome Day. Students and staff wore fun socks to celebrate how unique each person is.



EQUITY WORK















NPSD, including its school board and staff, seeks to develop a community that values and adapts to diversity, ensures belonging, and is inclusive of everyone. To that end, we have had four established goals in the areas of Cultural Proficiency and Equity (CP & E) to create an environment of respect where all members of the school community are empowered to learn, grow, and appreciate one another.

In early 2023, NPSD gathered staff and community members from the Inclusion Task Force and the CP & E committee to determine ways in which the groups' work and goals were aligned. While there were many overlaps, one significant and missing component was an examination of our systems and structures. With this in mind, we added the fifth goal to take a deeper look into these areas. During this process, we also recognized the importance of including teachers, administrators and community members that provide insight and expertise from an inclusion lens on all of the committees. At this time, we also expanded the name to CPE & I to make transparent our commitment to inclusion and inclusive practices.

Cultural Proficiency, Equity and Inclusion Established Goals of NPSD

Update for the 2022-2023 school year



GOAL

Increase the knowledge, skill, and practices of all staff related to cultural proficiency/ cultural responsiveness which will reduce the achievement gap at NPSD.



Provided professional development support to a variety of staff members on topics related to Cultural Proficiency, Equity, and Inclusion. NPSD had seven dedicated early dismissal days for CPE & I and topics included Equity Walks, the Science of Reading, Best Instructional Practices, Math with an Equity Lens, Authentic Assessment, Building Relationships and more.



GOAL

Reduce the number of Black, Hispanic, and Multiracial students who are disproportionately represented in special education programs and disproportionately suspended from school so that the risk ratio for these subgroups is no greater than 1.5 times more likely.

PROGRESS

The committee completed an extensive review of discipline data with top areas of concern. A product has been a shared sheet for alternatives to suspension for elementary and secondary to help address concerns noted.

GOAL

Implement practices that promote an increased pool of diverse applicants for positions across all employee groups.



The NPHS Consider Becoming an Educator group met with approximately 40 students in attendance. The turnout included students from all the culture clubs, student ambassadors, and students in education related classes. NPSD also hosted an Affinity Group Gathering where diverse educators of color bonded and supported their experience working in the district. NPSD Human Resources staff attended various job fairs to recruit diverse candidates.





GOAL

Increase student, staff and family engagement in cultural proficiency efforts.

PROGRESS

The committee maintained collaborative communications with annual school/community events that include the Black History Oratorical Competition, Parents in Equity Committee, and Colors of Pride presentations at North Penn High School.



GOAL

Collaboratively utilize evidence-based practices and foster an inclusive mindset with high expectations for all to enhance current systems and structures for staff and students that provide equitable access, promote safety, belonging and social-emotional well-being, and elevate post-graduate student outcomes.

PROGRESS

Brand new committee and formulated our goal and objectives for the upcoming school year. This includes providing equitable access and fostering an inclusive environment.

HAN VER STUDY

In the spring of 2022, NPSD administration worked with Hanover Research to conduct a climate survey of parents, community, *staff and students. The key objectives were* to understand stakeholders' perception of the current climate of North Penn, recognize differences in perceptions across groups and identify areas of strength and opportunities for improvement. More than 4,000 responses were collected.

POSITIVE FINDINGS INCLUDED:

- · Most respondents agreed that their school offers enough high-quality co-curricular and extracurricular activities and provides enough resources and support for students of all backgrounds;
- · Overall, most respondents provided positive ratings of NPSD's communication and engagement efforts;
- Overall, most parents expressed positive sentiments regarding engagement from school staff: and
- · Overall, respondents mostly expressed positive sentiments regarding NPSD's social environment.

KEY FINDINGS INCLUDED THE FOLLOWING NEEDS:

- · Develop student academic and non-academic supports and procedures that increase the development of soft skills (self-reflection, conflict resolution, emotion management, etc.), and improve student discipline procedures;
- Review and increase current mental health support systems for students and identify strategies to support underperforming students;
- · Address staff and parent needs by increasing transparency regarding decision-making;
- · Provide professional development that promotes cultural responsiveness in the classroom; and
- · Address harassment toward students based on their sexual orientation, gender identity or expression and physical appearance.



Goals were set for the 2023-2024 school year to address the key findings.







HIGHLIGHTS

from the **2022-2023** school year

Students from grades 3-12 selected to compete in the **Black History Oratorical Competition** performed monologues from African-American and Black leaders.



The Extended School Care Program introduced activity boxes at all 13 elementary schools with a Children Around the World theme, containing fact sheets, children's books, games, crafts and activities that children from France, Mexico, China, Japan, Nigeria, Egypt, Brazil and India enjoy.



Funded by a partnership between the VNA Foundation and the NPSD Educational Foundation, the Race and Racial Identity project aimed to create a space for community members from North Penn, Methacton, Perkiomen Valley and Souderton school districts to engage in facilitated conversations that strengthened understanding of one another and provided the tools to engage in meaningful dialogue about race and racial identity.









Pennbrook, Penndale and Pennfield middle schools participated in a "One Book" program, promoting the book Refugee by Alan Gratz. Pennbrook displayed a boat in the library as a challenge to "fill the boat" with donated items to make refugee hygiene kits. In all, students assembled more than 90 kits to be donated.



Nash Elementary students celebrated the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors originated from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America during National Hispanic Heritage Month.



Students, staff, and community visitors at Inglewood Elementary participated in Mix It Up Day and enjoyed lunch with others they didn't know well to encourage conversation and connections with different people.

Students in the North Penn High School's Muslim Student Association (MSA) hosted the Iftar, a feast and gathering where Muslims celebrating Ramadan break their fast and pray.





orth Penn High School Theatre and Thespian Troupe 5464 was selected to perform Disney's *Frozen: The Broadway Musical* as part of a nationwide competition among U.S. high schools for the rights to perform the show at the high school level for the first time. The competition, The United States of *Frozen, Love is an Open Door*, selected one high school from each U.S. state and territory to receive the



exclusive rights to the show. NPHS was selected out of 300 high school applicants to perform the first and only production of Disney's *Frozen* in a high school in Pennsylvania. The North Penn community had the opportunity to experience the ONLY production in the Commonwealth. The April 2023 production sold out all seven shows!

Based on the 2013 animated feature film, Disney's stage adaptation of *Frozen* opened on Broadway in March 2018. Music and lyrics by Kristen Anderson-Lopez and Robert Lopez, book written by Jennifer Lee, it tells the story of two sisters and princesses, Anna and Elsa. Elsa has magical powers to freeze objects, and she loses control of these powers when she suddenly inherits the throne. Anna has to save her sister and the kingdom from eternal winter. This is the first time the full-length stage adaptation of *Frozen* is available for high school students to perform.

North Penn High School presents: *Frozen Defrosted*, a behind-the-scenes look at the production of Disney's *Frozen, the Broadway Musical*. The documentary premiered on North Penn Television (NPTV). The entire documentary, from filming to editing, was created by NPHS

students in the career study program with NPTV. The documentary consisted of three episodes that took viewers through the production process of putting together a musical, from auditions to the final curtain. Frozen Defrosted aired exclusively on NPTV. NPTV can be streamed on local Comcast channel 28, local Verizon channel 29, YouTube, and on Fire TV, Apple TV, and ROKU apps.

Since the state provided a one-time bonus rebate, the North Penn Board of School Directors voted to do the same.





NPSD SNS Coordinator Instrumental in Continuation of Universal Free Breakfast Program

North Penn's very own Melissa Froehlich Green, Coordinator of School Nutrition Services (SNS), was instrumental in creating Pennsylvania's universal free breakfast program for the 2022-2023 school year. While North Penn was able to continue universal free breakfast this year, Melissa recognized the need across the state, and worked to ensure that no child had to go to school hungry. Pennsylvania funded universal free breakfast for the 1.7 million pub-

lic school students across the state. Additionally, the "reduced lunch" category was eliminated at North Penn, and students who qualified for reduced price meals could also receive free lunch. Melissa didn't stop at the state level, she and others headed to Washington, D.C. and spoke to Congress about implementing a free meal program for all students across the country. This topic will continue to be discussed in the future as there is currently no nation-wide program. The dedicated NPSD SNS staff consisting of 36 full-time, 95 part-time and 9 substitute employees served 590,822 breakfast meals and 966,890 lunch meals to students during the

2022-2023 school year. The summer feeding program provided daily nutritious foods to children 18 and under with 13,997 breakfast meals, 17,741 lunch meals, and 13,555 snacks.



The center offers free healthcare, including no-cost medications, to employees and their dependents enrolled in the North Penn insurance plans. The center is staffed by Everside Health employees. Patients can receive primary and preventative care, all at no-cost. The center is projected to save NPSD up to \$10 million over the next 10 years in health care costs by providing lower-cost treatments and options before medical issues grow costly. Since opening, the center staff have conducted 887 appointments and 90 percent of patients scored the care they received as a 9 or a 10, on a scale of 1 through 10.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND SAFE SCHOOLS

Brandon J. Rhone was sworn in as the Coordinator of Emergency Management & Safe Schools and is responsible for public safety solutions within the district as well as direction of safety personnel within the 18 North Penn schools. Brandon came to North Penn with 17 years experience as a police officer in Pennsylvania with a focus on school safety. He retired from the force as a decorated Operations Captain.



The Office of Emergency Management and Safe Schools covered 800 shifts, including normal day shifts, special events and sports. Officers documented 1,416 security related incidents across the district and were often called upon to assist building administration with a variety of situations.

The district's threat assessment team, led by Brandon Rhone, Coordinator of Emergency Management & Safe Schools, grew during the 2022-2023 school year. All members of the team received level 1 and level 2 training through the CSTAG model. The district was able to customize and integrate the reporting and interview process into the current Infinite Campus student database streamlining the documentation warehousing. This allowed for better followup and communication within the district's teams.

The district added two full time positions to Pennbrook and Pennfield middle schools. These resources provided additional support to the building and allowed Officers to foster meaningful relationships with students to create a safe environment that is conducive to learning. The department also added 60 cameras in buildings across the district.

Coordinator of Emergency Management and Safe Schools, Brandon Rhone established the first North Penn High School Student Safety Committee. This committee of students meet to discuss safety related topics concerning the student body.

The department hosted its first **Building Bridges** event where community members including students and law enforcement discussed their experiences in the community. This was an impactful event and all parties walked away being able to understand each other's experiences.



TRANSPORTATION

Between North Penn, First Student and other contracted drivers, they drove over **2.2 million miles** during the 2022-2023 school year.



Eight new propane buses were added to the fleet through a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).



Here Comes the Bus launched to the entire district in January 2023, providing families with real-time data about when the bus will arrive and any delays that may occur.



Dennis Ryan, Coordinator of Transportation, accepted the **"Energy for Everyone Hero" Award** by the Propane Education and Research Council (PERC) on behalf of NPSD. The award recognizes a school district that is implementing clean energy initiatives that put students, the community and the environment first.







EXTENDED SCHOOL CARE

Jacqueline O'Beirne, Ed.D. was appointed as the new Extended School Care Coordinator and joins NPSD with over 20 years of experience in education and childcare.

Focused on reducing the waitlist for students to enter the Extended School Care program.

- 16 additional students started on September 11
- 36 additional students were invited into the program for October 1 due to the hiring of two additional staff hired at Gwyn Nor Elementary and one additional staff member at Gwynedd Square Elementary. These additions eliminated the waitlist at both schools.
- 12 students were invited to start at Bridle Path Elementary on October 16 due to the hiring of an additional staff member.
- Reshifting of staff allowed the program to welcome seven students into Hatfield Elementary and an additional **12** students were removed from the waitlist at Montgomery Elementary.

North Penn High School's **Re-Imagined Future**

Although conversations have occurred for many years, renovations to North Penn High School and the idea to bring ninth graders to NPHS intensified in the 2022-2023 school year and significant plans were made. Throughout the year, administration encouraged everyone to be involved and stay informed as the decision facing the North Penn community will shape the school district for generations to come.

Not renovating NPHS is not an option. It must occur because of the age and condition of the building and the financial challenges to operate it. However to what extent NPHS will be transformed is still to be determined and there are two options before the community.

Option one takes care of the infrastructure needs of the building, but also re-imagines NPHS to be a modern, flexible school with common areas, allowing for improved collaboration and learning. This option brings with it a unique opportunity to move ninth graders to the high school campus creating expanded opportunities for those students. An electoral debt referendum is required to fund this option.

Option two updates the school's infrastructures including electrical, plumbing and lighting, and the layout of NPHS would remain similar to what it has looked like since it opened in 1971. Ninth grade students would remain at middle schools.

To help community members better understand the needs of NPHS and how it could be transformed, tours are being held on Tuesdays from 6 to 7 pm throughout the fall 2023 and into January 2024 (11/14, 11/28, 12/12 and 1/9).



It is important that the entire North Penn community be informed and knowledgeable about the options, the estimated costs, and the serious physical needs at NPHS. Please visit the Re-Imagine NPHS website at www.reimaginenphs.org to learn more about the historic decision that is before the community.

Note, at the time of this annual report's printing in early October, the referendum date and the exact costs of option 1 and 2 were not finalized.
